Volunteer Spotlight

Her friends and acquaintances have suggested that she sell her beautiful sweaters. But her response is that she likes to knit for the babies. She also enjoys spending time with the other volunteers at the Medica Skyway Senior Center.

Agency Spotlight – Everyday Miracles

Everyday Miracles (EM) is an innovative perinatal program that provides education and support to high-risk expectant mothers. The doula program works to decrease health disparities by directly increasing access to high quality health care for women at highest risk for poor birth outcomes. This unique program prioritizes the individual mother and family, but has positive impacts at a system level. A doula is a professionally trained woman experienced in childbirth who provides continuous physical, emotional and informational support to the mother before, during and just after childbirth. The program focuses on education and support services for these high-risk expectant mothers by providing comprehensive doula support services and culturally sensitive prenatal education with the objectives of improving birth outcomes, parent-infant attachment and breastfeeding skills. High-risk is a categorization given to the expectant mothers because of factors in their lives which impede their ability to have a healthy pregnancy including such things as being age 21 or younger, being in a low income category or being a new immigrant to this country. The program uses innovative strategies to bring prevention messages and health information to high-risk mothers on their terms and in their language and culture.

The program served 329 families in 2007. To date in 2008, we have or are serving 311 families and expect to serve approximately 400 families this year. The women we serve come from all walks of life, but share something in common: they are low-income, qualifying for a state-funded insurance program, and are living below the poverty level. Everyday Miracles' doula program is not limited by county or

hospital or stage of pregnancy. The families served by our program include residents of the entire metro area, with the majority residing in Anoka, Hennepin and Ramsey Counties. These new mothers come from all ethnic backgrounds and range between 13 to 44 years old.

Many of the women served are immigrants who have no other family or support system in this country. They are new to this culture and the way of birth in this country. Women come to us homeless or living in shelters, with only the support of their husbands or partners, or with no one to support them. Having a doula provides support from a trained professional that is not so closely attached to the situation. The situations these women live in are stressful for many different reasons, but having the support of a doula enables the mother to celebrate her pregnancy and birth and feel a sense of hope for the future. Their doulas provide them a sense of community and the comfort that comes from knowing they are not alone.

We have been so fortunate to work with Bundles of Love. The bundles are joyfully received by the Doula's each month and given to the new mothers. For some families this is the only clothing they have for their new baby. One doula wrote "I love bringing bundles to families; I am always in awe myself as I open the bundle and go through it with a new mom. You can just see all the hard work that has been put into making the bags, blankets and clothes that are in the bundles and each one is different. We are able to bring them to moms who are in great need of these bundles. I brought one to a single mom recently and she could not believe everything that was included and she went on and on about how cute everything was. She asked me at first if she had to return it when she was done; she was so excited when I told her that it was hers to keep. THANK-YOU Bundles of Love!! Keep up the great work and I look forward to delivering more beautiful bundles of love to the families that I work for!"

Another doula shares a story of a young family who had just moved here from Chicago. "Mom was expecting her third baby. Her two older kids were born in Chicago, and when she moved to the Twin Cities, she had to leave her baby items behind. She was now working as many hours as she could at a nursing home, trying to make ends meet, and didn't have any family nearby to help out. She was thrilled when I brought her a bundle in September. Her baby arrived in October, just in time for a cold Minnesota winter to set in, and the clothes and blankets from her bundle made a world of difference in keeping her little boy warm. Thanks so much for making a difference in their lives!"

Yet another doula shares, "I had a client who came here to the States about eight months ago from Africa. When she got here she found out she was pregnant. Her boyfriend was still in Africa. She came to live with some family and literally had nothing for her little girl. I gave her the bundle on the first postpartum visit, and when I came back to see her at the last visit, she told me that she thanked God for all the help that Everyday Miracles was providing her and that she loved the gifts in the bundle of love." The doula adds that she could see her client's eyes light up when she received the bundle.

It is our hope that all of you at Bundles of Love know how much you are appreciated and what a huge need you are filling in the community. The work you do is truly a work "of the heart" and the love put into each bundle can be felt by everyone who comes in contact with them! Thank you so much!

Sometimes one does not plan for the good things that happen. An example was the donation made by the Lutheran Women's Missionary League. It started at a fabric store. Sandy Weiden at Mill End in Rochester checked out the fabric I was purchasing for Bundles of Love. She is a member of this church women's group. She told me about their annual service project and asked me for information about Bundles of Love. I did not have any brochures with me that day, but I took down her information so I could mail it to her.

That day I had a feeling that something great had happened but those feelings subsided after several months passed. Then the good news came! Sandy told me the group had chosen Bundles of Love for their service project.

They held their convention in Rochester, Minnesota, in June. A large number of women from southern Minnesota attended. But even before they came to the meeting they had started delivering baby items to our Bundles of Love drop off center. The weekend of their convention they brought handmade, new and gently used baby items which filled 170 large plastic bags and 61 boxes - approximately 10,000 items! Additional items were received from churches in the Twin Cities area and there are more things coming in!!!

To say the least, we were caught off guard by such a generous donation! But three months later we had used many of the items to fill 224 extra bundles. The huge donation, and the team work of several work groups made it possible to reach out to a larger area of southern Minnesota, fill requests from agencies in the Twin Cities area which had gone unfilled, and deliver bundles for the first time to additional organizations who had been on our waiting list. Many other "loose" items have been donated to hospitals, crisis centers and public health offices. The items we could not use in the bundles were also put to good use.

We will continue working until everything has been distributed. Imagine how many babies and families will know that someone cares!

Items we need....

Our growth in bundles distributed means a much larger need for Baby Care Items. Please consider ways you can help meet this need. Mention the need to families and friends who would like to help but have limited time. Ask whether co-workers, your church, or other organizations would host a 'Baby Shower' for us which focuses on baby soap or wash, newborn diapers, and travel size packages of baby wipes.

Fabric - soft knits such as interlock, t-shirt knits, flannel, broadcloth in 2 yd+ pieces for crib sheets

Other Baby Care Items: Other "nice to have" items which we include in bundles when available through donations are: bottles, pacifiers, teething rings, diaper rash ointment, etc.

Size Guidelines:

Booties

Foot lengths for booties are: small preemie (1-3 pounds) 1-2 inches; large preemie (3-5 pounds) 2.5 - 3 inches; newborn (6-10 pounds) 3-4 inches. Most needed are newborn sizes, unless you are making booties to be used for burial layettes (white or pastel colors are requested.)

Quilts

36x45 is commonly the size we make quilts, as this requires only 1 yard of backing and batting. If you use a warm backing fabric such as sweatshirt fleece or polar fleece, batting is not needed.

Afghans

30" to 36" square is a common size for crocheted or knitted afghans.

Receiving blankets

30" square single layer flannel

How did a family vacation turn into a “Benefit Fundraiser for Bundles of Love?”

In late winter of 2007, Joan Fisher, a long-time Bundles of Love Charity volunteer, and her family along with her brother-in-law's family went on a Caribbean cruise together. Each day the twelve family members went their own separate ways on island tours, but every night they would gather together before dinner at the “Martini Bar” and talk about the day's adventures. After doing this for seven days they became accustomed to socializing over cocktails and enjoying each other's company. They all agreed that they should get together for a martini party six months later to celebrate our adventures once again.

As spring turned into summer they talked more about the twelve of them getting together and reminisce about the cruise. Phil and his brother Rick suggested that instead of just the 12 of them getting together they should invite additional family and friends and celebrate the good times. Joan had the idea of expanding the party into a fundraiser for Bundles of Love Charity. They all agreed to the idea and set about planning for the “event.” The two dads worked on getting raffle prizes, the two moms worked on preparing food. Joan's son and son-in-law set up the bar and Sandy's son and son-in-law sold raffle tickets. Daughters and daughter-in-laws decorated and organized prizes.

Their first event was set in a tent in Joan's backyard on the only rainy Saturday that summer. There were still close to 80 relatives and friends who showed up and they raised over \$3,100.00. Teresa Wilts, the north metro work group coordinator, knew nothing of their efforts and was speechless when they delivered the proceeds the next day. The dozen had so much fun that they agreed to make it an annual event. This past August the family once again hosted another “Bundles of Love” Martini Party. Over 120 people attend this year and the Fisher Family raised over \$5,100.00.

A week after the party the twelve got together to “debrief” and decide if they wanted to do this again. There was a unanimous “YES” by the family for the “Third Annual Bundles of Love Fundraiser and Martini Party” for 2009.

This is one family's effort towards helping those little ones in need. Think about what you can do to help others and believe us, your efforts are worth it!

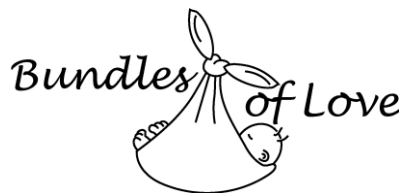
